The Social Strategic Sector: Social services, health, education & youth



Social Strategic Sector

- ➤ There have been impressive gains in social services across Timor-Leste in the last ten years, but women and children and those living in rural areas are still not seeing enough material improvements in basic services and opportunities
- ➤ The Social Strategic Sector may be the greatest challenge in Timor-Leste but effective education, health and nutrition are essential foundations for economic development and sustained growth

Social Strategic Sector

Nutrition

- 2013 National Nutrition Survey shows some improvements
- Leadership on food security and nutrition under the banner of the Zero Hunger Action Plan and KONSSANTIL coordination

Gender

Increased attention to gender equality in policy making, planning and budgeting

Examples of effective joint work with Social Sector Ministries

Ministry of Health

- The rapid decline in child mortality and improved nutrition indicators
- Polio eradication, maternal and neonatal tetanus elimination and rapid malaria case reduction
- The scale-up of services reaching communities
- New strategies for Nutrition, Maternal Child Health, Laboratories and other critical areas
- Deployment of junior Cuban-trained doctors in health facilities in sub-districts and villages

Examples of effective joint work with Social Sector Ministries

Ministry of Education and SEPFOPE

- > Significant improvement in net enrolment rates
- Development and approval of new curriculum for Preschool, Grades 1-6 and teacher training
- Focus on early childhood including National Policy on Preschool Education
- Building more schools with furniture and learning materials
- Effective vocational training linked to jobs

Examples of effective joint work with Social Sector Ministries

Ministry of Social Solidarity, SEPI, all

- Protection of women and girls: implementation of National Action Plan on Gender-Based Violence and Domestic Violence Law
- > Information systems for social assistance
- Focus on people with disability
- Disaster prevention along the Dili-Ainaro road corridor
- National youth development fund

Challenges

- Despite significant improvements, some human development indicators remain poor
- ➤ Providing tangible, sustainable results through better social services to rural, poor and vulnerable populations is challenging
- ➤ This is particularly challenging in Timor-Leste, due to geography and history — but there is strong and sustained international support to help Timor-Leste meet its goals

Challenges

- > Improving the productivity of the labour force is crucial
- ➤ Linking DPCM with the planning and budgetary processes of ministries, especially operations and maintenance planning and budgeting
- ➤ Intra-sectoral and inter-sectoral coordination for effective implementation of DPCM particularly on youth and women
- Capacity development requires links with human resource performance management
- ➤ Evidence based policy making, planning and budgeting

The way forward

- The New Deal is all about focus and coordination
- Development Partners need to genuinely align behind strategies that set realistic targets with clear accountability
- Ministries need to devote time to discussing their goals and priorities with Development Partners, and agreeing our respective roles in helping deliver results

The way forward

- One Vision One Plan (New Deal) Merge DPCM and internal planning and budgeting process of Ministries into a single process, setting realistic targets with clear accountability
- Operationalize institutional coordination with accountability mechanisms particularly at sub-sector level
- Establish long term human resources development strategy and performance management
- Effective use of data for evidence-based policy making, planning and budgeting

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
